Architectural Control Committee

Per the newly filed Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions, in effect since June 13th, we have an approved Architectural Review Committee (ARC). The ARC was put in place to protect our property values by ensuring that all visible new construction, maintenance, and landscaping is in concert with the look and feel of the neighborhood. It is required for each of us, BEFORE making any visible exterior changes, to make contact with the ARC for plan approval. General maintenance or replacement of exterior features with 'like kind and color' does not require ARC approval. The ARC is currently working on a procedure for reporting your proposed changes. NOVEMBER GARDENING TIPS

November brings us cooler weather, shorter days, and a chance to sit back, relax and see the beautiful results of all our fall planting. Many of us have just finished changing out our flower beds from summer to winter color. We've pulled up old plant material, worked in some good organic matter such as cow manure and compost, and planted cool weather annuals such as pansies and cabbages. But wait! There's one more thing



to consider...because it's spring bulb season!

Our local nurseries offer a large and tempting selection of spring blooming bulbs right now. There are numerous varieties of daffodils and tulips to choose from along with snow drops, crocuses, grape hyacinths, and regular hyacinths, just to name a few. The real trick is in choosing the right bulbs to get the most show for your money next spring.

CHOOSE CAREFULLY

Choose healthy, blemish and mold free bulbs from your nursery. When healthy bulbs are squeezed slightly they are firm



and solid like an onion. Next, be sure to chill your bulbs for 3 to 4 weeks in a refrigerator (not the freezer) to simulate winter hibernation. After chilling, plant the bulbs root side down at the recommended depth printed on the back of the bulb package with a tablespoon of bone meal thrown into each hole.

Water sparingly as too much water can cause root rot. Bulbs can be planted directly into your flowerbeds among your annuals, in your ground cover,

or in pots. All bulbs should be planted before freezing cold weather or New Years in our area to achieve the best results. Finally, keep an eye out for tunnels in your turf and beds because moles love to eat bulbs.

EXTEND YOUR FLOWERING SEASON

Bulbs can extend and expand the spring blooming season, providing a parade of changing color outside from February through April. To do this, choose bulbs with a variety of blooming times. Most tulip bulb packages will designate bloom time clearly, listing the bulb as an early, middle or late springtime bloomer. By planting tulips from all three bloom times in the same bed, you can extend bloom time from two to almost four weeks.

Bloom times also differ among the different types of flowers. Crocuses and snowdrops announce the beginning of the bloom season in late February. This is followed by the daffodils in early March, and then the tulips and grape hyacinths from late March into April. The last tulip petals will fall quickly within a few days of continual heat or during a hailstorm, which ever comes first!

EXTRA SURPRISES

In Texas, bigger is usually better...with the exception of the little narcissi...they look like small daffodils. Multi packs of narcissi mixed with grape hyacinths are available in the nurseries. These plants will look phenomenal planted in a bed of ground cover such as Asian Jasmine. The



two plants poke their heads from under the ground cover in mid to late spring and provide a charming display near walkways where up close viewing is possible.

Finally, don't forget to purchase extra bulbs for indoor forcing. Take a few bulbs from the refrigerator every two weeks and plant them in bulb pots... you'll have continual color in your house from December onward. Paper white narcissi and amaryllis are perfect choices for this.

With a little planning and wise purchasing you can pump up your spring landscape with all the beauty and variety that spring bulbs have to offer. Good luck & Good Gardening!!
